GOD'S PROMISE DURING DIFFICULT TIMES

A Word from Our Stewardship Department

You don't have to look far today to either hear or read something about the state of our economy. It's all over the news and in print. Record gas prices, with no stop in sight. Record oil prices, with some economists predicting \$200.00 barrel prices. The stock market, which to this writing has lost 10% of it's value this year. The sub-prime mortgage mess, which is estimated to cost 1.4 trillion dollars when it's said and done, not to mention the arrest of over 400 individuals last week by the justice department on fraud charges involved in the mortgage industry. Inflation creeping up, and higher fuel costs trickling down to increased prices of food and energy.

Debt is at an all time high in the United States. Recently, the former comptroller general (chief CPA for the United States) David Walker stated "I am very worried about the future of this country. Americans have become addicted to debt, and the accumulating IOU's may sink our ship."

It is during these times that we as Christians can have peace in knowing that God is in control of all, and He is our provider. He promises to provide our needs. "And my God shall supply all your need according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:19) The economy is our reality, and it is a very trying time for some people. That is real. So is the contentment and peace that can come when we practice biblical stewardship principles and put our faith in God as Our Provider.

Do you really think that God's ability to provide for our needs is controlled by the ups and downs of the stock market, or the price of oil, or inflation? We think in our own little box, and sometimes put God's ability in with what we can see and think. God's ways are so much

higher than what we can fathom. God's ability to provide for His people is not controlled by the state of our current economy. "It is expected of stewards that each one be found faithful." (I Corinthians 4:2) We have to do our part, but through faith and obedience, God will provide.

God's work during even these difficult times can be evidenced with what has been taking place here at North Street Christian Church. We finished last year with the annual budget in the black, with income exceeding expenses. Through the first half of this year, our budget is balanced, with each department also maintaining a balanced budget. All the work that has been done at Legacy house is paid for, without any debt. The church has purchased an adjoining property for future use, without taking on any debt. The annex was in need of roof repairs, which were completed in April, and paid for without any debt. We have had master plans drawn up for our future capital campaign and building plans without incurring any debt. We have continued to provide for the needs of all the missionaries whom God supports through North Street during these times.

God is faithful in all times, even these difficult times. Giving is the key to contentment, and the only antidote to materialism. The Apostle Paul quotes Christ Jesus as saying, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." (Acts 20:35.) Do we really believe that? Giving per individual through the first 6 months of this year is up over the previous 2 years by approximately 15%. God has and will be faithful as our provider, even during difficult times when we do our part, IN FAITH as stewards of what He has entrusted to our management.

THE WOUNDED ONES

My Bible College days are long over. It has been over 35 years since I began my student run at Johnson Bible College in Knoxville, Tennessee. As a recent convert from Catholicism, not knowing much of the Bible at all and an 18 year old newlywed (1 day when we arrived on campus which by the way, we had never seen), Kathi and I were certainly walking by faith!

I learned lots of good lessons in those days - some in the classroom, some in the work program, some in the Church and some through personal relationships. There are many memorable ones that have stuck with me through the years. Let me recall one life lesson - it was learned in chapel.

The speaker's words in that chapel service echo in my mind from time to time. I don't remember Who said it or the particular occasion. But the words do still resound. The speaker said, "The Church is the only army that shoots its own wounded." That statement caught my attention. I mulled it over, again and again. I liked it but I didn't like it! I have found it to be true many times; sometimes not – but it happens. Have you ever no-

ticed that Church people do have a tendency to do that **– shoot their own wounded -** at least sometimes?

When people drift away and have fallen into sin – do we run to them or from them? When someone has been caught in a sin – do we throw a lifeline or pull up anchor and row away? When a visible leader encounters trouble – do we talk to him or about him? Do we come along side and offer our help or watch him sink? When someone is not as active as they used to be – do we give him/her a call and word of encouragement or say, "O well, he/she wasn't that committed anyhow?"

The war policy of the military is to *leave* no man behind. It would be good if the Church was as passionate. A wounded soldier needs a buddy to rescue him. Sometimes it is a shoulder to lean on. Sometimes it is a commanding word to "Hang in there" and to "not die on me!" Sometimes a wounded soldier needs life breathed back into him and sometimes he needs someone on the outside to keep his heart beating! Sometimes a

wounded soldier needs picked up and carried to safety.

Look around this Church. See any wounded? Will you run to or from? Throw a lifeline or row away? Talk to or about? Offer help or watch them sink?

We shoot rabid animals, half dead cats and dogs and racehorses with broken legs. But not wounded soldiers. Do we?
